

In the mystery of the Incarnation, the Son of God comes to earth in search of men who, like stray sheep, have wandered away from the sheepfold and have become lost in the dark valley of sin. . . . Jesus said, "I am the Good Shepherd, and I give my life for my sheep" and in the Office for Paschal time, the Church chants many times: "The Good Shepherd is risen, He who gave His life for His sheep and who died for His flock." What could be a better synthesis of the whole work of the Redemption? . . . Again Jesus said: "I know Mine, and Mine know Me, even as the Father knows Me and I know the Father." Although there is no question here of equality, but merely that of a simple comparison, it is nevertheless very consoling and glorious for us to see how Jesus likes to compare His relations with us to those He has with His Father. . . . This shows that between us, the sheep, and Jesus, our Shepherd, there is not only a relation of acquaintance, but also one of love, and better still, of a communion of life, similar to that which exists between the Son and the Father. It is by means of the grace, faith, and charity, which the Good Shepherd acquired for us by His death, that we arrive at such intimacy with our God—so deep that it makes us share in His own divine life.

New St. Agnes Parishioners "The Revert and the Convert"

How do a formerly lapsed Catholic and dyed-in-the-wool Protestant now find themselves in the pews of the faithful at St Agnes? According to newly registered parishioners Angela and Scott White, it's a long story going back many years. Scott calls himself "a religious mutt of sorts." He was raised Catholic like his policeman father, but Scott's mother would usually take her two sons to her Baptist church on the Sundays that her husband often had to work. Confirmed, and even looking to delve more deeply into the Faith, Scott nevertheless walked away in college, captivated by the "prosperity gospel" preached on television. Angela's family was Christian but did not attend church much beyond Easter and Christmas, and she received no religious instruction. She felt drawn early on to faith and spent hours looking at a book of Bible stories in her home, trying hard to live up to the "angel" in her name. When she was old enough to walk there alone, she began attending a little Baptist church near her house. Her formation was a "crazy-quilt" of things she gathered at the church (no Sunday school) and "figured out" for herself.

Scott and Angela met in high school and married seven years later, by which time Scott was an Evangelical and Angela was sincere in loving Christ but flexible as far as church, not seeing any significant difference between them. She did, however, strongly want to have communion as part of their wedding ceremony; communion not being a regular part of an evangelical service, items were rounded

up that served the purpose and Angela had communion for the first time. "I didn't know it at the time, and wouldn't have had words for it, but even then I was reaching for a more sacramental life," she says.

Over the years, the couple church-hopped, looking for a place that felt like home. They had a daughter and a son, and Angela became involved in children's church. Scott's talents in singing and playing percussion, piano, guitar, and bass, and Angela's skill as a flutist led them to join the worship team at whatever church they attended. Scott remembers having a "nagging sense of something missing" and reacted by becoming more involved in his church, even appointed an elder in 2012. The nagging persisted, though, and recalling his early years as a Catholic, he began to study the tenants of the Faith. His desire to learn more became insatiable. "I contemplated the things I had learned as a child but with the wisdom and maturity of an adult." In 2016 he returned to the Church and was particularly drawn to the beauty of the Latin Mass at St. Agnes. Angela assumed this was just another church hop that would run its course, but Scott's increasing level of contentment and satisfaction as a Catholic began to cause a division between the couple. Scott spent

the next five years patiently explaining his love for the Church to her, sharing his newly recovered faith, and most of all praying for the conversion of his beloved wife. They had many and varied conversations during these years spent in two worlds, with Scott attending Mass by himself and then going to church with Angela to support her. "I felt torn and confused during this time," Angela said, "like Scott had gone somewhere I couldn't follow. But then, God called my bluff. If there was no difference between churches beyond forms of worship and maybe the look of the building, then He said it was time to 'get off the fence' and join Scott." As an act of obedience and desire to be a wife like Ruth, she told Scott she would join the Catholic Church. "God took that one small step of obedience and rewarded it beyond my wildest dreams, because I finally found the underlying fabric for the crazy-quilt of faith." With a happy heart, she was baptized and confirmed and received her First Holy Communion at the Easter Vigil in 2023 at Immaculate Conception Church in Denham Springs, where the couple lives. Bishop Duca blessed their marriage, and in December they celebrated their 30th wedding anniversary with a renewal of vows and blessing by Father Brent. "The revert and the convert have at last found their church home and are happy it is St. Agnes," says Scott. We at St. Agnes are equally happy!

MAJOR ROGATION & FEAST OF ST. MARK

Thursday April 25, 5:30 pm, Traditional Latin Mass

The Rogation Days are April 25, called Major, and the three days before the feast of the Ascension, called Minor. April 25 is also the Feast of St. Mark, established at a very early date. Major Rogation is said to have been introduced to counteract the ancient Robigalia, on which the heathens held processions and supplications to their gods. St. Gregory the Great (d. 604) regulated the already existing custom. The word "rogation" has its origins in the Latin word *rogare*, which means to supplicate or ask. The purpose of the Rogation Days is to beg God for His mercy, to turn away His anger, and to ask Him to bless the fruits of the earth while protecting us from natural disasters.
