NOVENA PRAYER FOR EUCHARISTIC REVIVAL WEEK FIVE

The Eucharist is Someone, not something: Our Lord Jesus, fully present here and now! Belief in that doctrine is not enough. Actions must align with belief. *Adoration* of Him is necessary. At Mass, we adore both actively (gesture, vocal prayer, song) and contemplatively (gazing wordlessly upon Him). For nine Sundays, we will pray together the Eucharistic Revival novena prayers on the pamphlet in the pews. We are also encouraged to spend an hour in adoration before Him each week.


None of the sacraments would be possible were it not for the Incarnation. The transfiguration of Christ illustrates this mystery in a brilliant way: the uncreated light and glory of the divinity is manifested and communicated through the created medium of the material body of Jesus. The transfiguration therefore tells us: the Incarnation is true, the sacraments are real.... As we come to the Holy Eucharist, we come for an experience of transfiguration. Christ Himself, the same Christ that we're celebrating standing on Mt. Tabor shining with the glory of God, is going to enter into the darkness of our own body and soul and He's going to shine from within us, too-if we let Him, if we humbly approach Him and let Him come to us, touch us, speak to us those words of consolation, and call us to a fuller, nobler life, where we can really give ourselves to this universal work of the transfiguration of the whole universe, which we'll see accomplished in the end, and we'll be amazed to see that we had something to do with that. through our faithfulness to God. Let us come to Him now, with joy and gratitude and awe, as if we were standing on that same holy mountain. We should let Him take us into Himself, so we can hear the voice of the Father saying how much He loves us, how much He regards us and accepts us as His sons and daughters. Then we too will walk in that mystery of crucifixion, yet of transfiguration, and ultimately of the glory of resurrection.

The Ordinary of the Mass includes the prayers whose H text remains the same at every Mass: the Kyrie, Gloria, H Gospel Acclamation, Credo, Sanctus, Memorial Acclamation, Our Father, and Agnus Dei. In recent weeks at St. Agnes, some of the Ordinary has begun to be sung in Greek or Latin at the Sunday 11 am and 4 pm Anticipated Masses. The following excerpt from the Vatican II document Sacrosanctum Concilium (1963) may help explain why. "The use of the Latin language is to be preserved in the Latin rites. (36) . . . In Masses which are celebrated with the people, a suitable place may be allotted to their mother tongue. This is to apply in the first place to the readings and 'the common prayer,' but also, as local conditions may warrant, to those parts which pertain to the people, according to the norm laid down in Art. 36 of this Constitution. Nevertheless steps should be taken so that the faithful may also be able to say or to sing together in Latin those parts of the Ordinary of the Mass which pertain to them. (54)" Earlier, in 1962, Pope Saint John XXIII had written in *Veterum Sapientia*, "[The Church] values especially the Greek and Latin languages in which wisdom itself is cloaked, as it were, in a vesture of gold. . . . A primary place must surely be given to that language which had its origins in Latium, and later proved so admirable a means for the spreading of the Christianity throughout the West. And since in God's special Providence this language united so many nations together under the authority of the Roman Empire—and that for so many centuries—it also became the rightful language of the Apostolic See." Sheets with the prayers being chanted in Greek or Latin at the 4 pm and 11 am Masses may be found in the pews.
